Key Knowledge	Know and demonstrate how to show depth on the face by using a full range of tones with graphite. Recall and understand the colour wheel and its arrangement of primary, secondary and tertiary colours. Know and demonstrate how to blend primary-coloured pencils to create secondary and tertiary coloures. Know and demonstrate how to create skin tones and depth by overlapping and varying the pressure of coloured pencils. Know and demonstrate how to use range a tone and texture when depicting hair with coloured pencil. Know what is meant by the term 'Cubism' and identify its main features.	Know about Pablo Picasso and the importance of his work within Cubism. Know what is meant by the term reference points and how they are used. Know and demonstrate how to use reference points to complete an artist study of the Weeping Woman Create an artist study by using a full range of tones and directional shading. Create a research page on Cubism. Investigate the work of Cubist artists and their link to the depiction of musical instruments. Know and demonstrate how to use reference points and coloured pencil technique to complete an artist study based on Cubism musical instruments	Design a full and varied composition by accurately tracing musical instruments. To know what is meant by a hue, tint and shade. To mix and apply a range of tints and shades showing progression. Paint with increased accuracy - within the lines of their composition and following the line of the brush. Paint with blended gradual tone. Paint using a wide range of tints and shades within their composition. Know what is meant by mixed media; use collage within our work, showing appropriately placed sections cut with accuracy	Explore drawing exercises (blind contour, continuous line, gestural and timed) during observational drawing of a shoe. Create an artist research page on an artist who investigates shoes within their work (Lisa Milroy, Cath Riley, Wayne Thiebaud, Gordon Saedt) Know what is meant by the grid method. Use the grid method to accurately recreate from a photograph. Create an observational drawing of a shoe using a full range of tones, directional shading and refined detail. Explore mark making within biro art. Investigate the work of Nicola McBride and use her work to inform our own.	Recall and understand the colour wheel and its arrangement. Blend each secondary and tertiary colour within a patterned surface, showing gradual tone. Investigate the use of pattern within Durer's Rhino Explore creating tone from pattern using fine liners; know that dense and sparce patterns create tone; To explore zentangles. Develop our work from observational shoe drawings, to create a repeated pattern. Demonstrate using a variety of pattern and line, with fine liners, within own reflected composition.	Know about Tom Philips and the main features of his work. Apply the features of 'text art' using appropriate illustration and variety of line to create own Blackout poetry, Know about Jasper Johns and the main feature of his work to make the 'everyday unrecognisable' - to force us to look more closely. Create own overlapped number and letter design in the style of Jasper Johns Use refined brush work to paint each section of a Jasper Johns inspired design. Create and apply an appropriate colour scheme with thought and precision
