Course Content

Performing = 35%

Students perform a recital, playing one or a number of pieces totalling a minimum of 10 minutes. These can be solo or ensemble pieces.

Composition = 25%

Students must create 2 compositions:

Composition I = to a brief set my AQA

Composition 2 = free composition

The compositions need a combined time of over 4 and a half minutes

Written exam = 40%

The exam is 2 hours and 30 minutes long and is split into 3 sections:

Section A: Listening

Section B: Analysis

Section C: Essay

To prepare for the exam you will learn about **three areas of study**. Western Classical Tradition from 1650-1910 is compulsory. However, there is then a choice of two other areas of study from the list below:

Lesson style:

Lessons are predominantly practical in nature, with students exploring concepts through practical music making. Compositional techniques, analytical and listening skills will also be developed.

Time Allocation:

2 years of study. All assignments will be assessed in the May/June of the final year.

Private Study:

Private study will consist of:

1.Students creating ideas for their compositions

2.Private practice to prepare for their performance recital

3. Listening to and analysing a wide range of music genres to prepare for the listening exam.

Advisable for following careers:

Film or TV composer, performer, songwriter, music education, music therapy, radio, events management. However, the skills acquired through the study of music make students employable in a much wider variety of career paths including law, medicine etc..
